Evidence



- Reasons for issuing the claim
- Ensure evidence deals with any statutory tests/relevant guidance
- Show you have informed/consulted if this is a statutory requirement
- Reasons for urgency/applying without notice
- Explain the order being asked for, especially anything unusual
- Service

Taylor v Solihull MBC



[2020] EWHC 412 (Admin), 25 February 2020

- Case stated appeal from Magistrates' Court
- Solihull applied for a closure order under the ASBCPA 2014 and wanted to rely on
 - the fact that the appellant had been arrested for a drugs offence and what he had said in his interview under caution
 - The fact that the police had executed a search warrant and what had been discovered in that search (cannabis, cocaine, scales, plastic bags, bowls with residue, mobile phone, £500 cash)
- The App argued that these matters should not be admitted as they related to an ongoing criminal investigation, presumption of innocence, right not to incriminate himself, Mags rejected App's argument
- High Court, Chamberlain J: fact of arrest and search could be relied upon, products of search were of probative value, nothing to suggest *App* was responsible (and not did CO test require this), just that this is what had been found, could be admitted

Things to think about



- Do you need a hearsay notice?
- Do you need to redact documents to remove sensitive information, things that might identify an anonymous source, email addresses, postal address, telephone numbers

Statement of truth



New wording for statements of truth from 6.4.20, PD 22:

- **2.1** The form of the statement of truth verifying a statement of case, a response, an application notice, a certificate of reasons or a notice of objections should be as follows:
- '[I believe][the (claimant or as may be) believes] that the facts stated in this [name document being verified] are true. I understand] [The (claimant or as may be) understands that proceedings for contempt of court may be brought against anyone who makes, or causes to be made, a false statement in a document verified by a statement of truth without an honest belief in its truth.'

Signatures

 CPR 5.3: the requirement contained in any rules or practice direction for a document to be signed can be met if the signature is printed by computer or other mechanical means
